# Year 3 Ancient Egypt Inquiry Unit

In Year 3 students had a fascinating time learning about life in Ancient Egypt from 3000 years ago.

"They learned some important skills in our inquiry process and started wondering and asking many questions so we could delve deep into understanding more about life in the past" Ms Fisher said.

They learned how to draw timelines and how to use different sources and artefacts to teach themselves about the ancient Egyptians. They also learned

note-taking skills and how to draw mind maps.



Students investigated how the pyramids were built, why the Nile River was so important; then also made a comparison of Ancient Egypt and

modern Egypt and noted the differences and similarities.

By far Year 3's favourite activity was designing an Egyptian mask and headdress, but unfortunately they remained unfinished when school was put under lockdown. "We hope to one day put the designs together, but in the meantime the students dressed up at home as a person from Ancient Egypt," Mrs Marandu said.



Secondary students were also busy in Mrs Murray's class with a fun quiz identifying brands and their impact on their marketing recognition.


#### **YEAR 3 ENGLISH**

We are fortunate to have Victoria on board and look forward to a long and fruitful relationship.






### YEAR 7 AND YEAR 8 RADIO PLAYS

For those who are feeling creative, we would love to see some photos of you in costume dressed as your favourite character; or please send us in a personal painting, drawing, or picture that you have created.


