Adventure as students stepped outside their boundaries assisting with injured animals at animal Rescue, and competing in sports;


Leadership as our secondary students joined in online discussion hosted by a school in India and our Round Square student council led fundraising drives to execute the final IDEAL of

From a 204 year old Galapagos tortoise to baby ostriches, a group of Year 13 students had the privilege of seeing precious Tanzanian wildlife recuperating at C.R.E.W. (Centre for Rescue, Education and Wildlife in Tanzania) in Moshi, as part of their A2 Biology course.

Their tour started with owls, peacocks, horses and a wild pig and the stories of how these animals were rescued and nursed back to health, but later they were enthralled by the bigger animals like a "Handsome" the cheetah, the baby ostriches, the Galapagos tortoise and four baby elephants.






