


MEASUREMENT

was the word of the week in Primary with classes exploring the many ways of measuring things.

CAPACITY POTIONS AND DINOSAURS!

Year 3's were using metre rulers to measure the height of dinosaurs. Children were given a card with the height and width of a different dinosaur and they had to measure it so they could

see what size it might have been.



surprised at the sizes they drew. Miss Zawadi from Bandari school joined us for the session. She has been visiting our classes each Friday for Maths training as part of our commitment to ongoing training of local teachers.

> in the local schools in Mto wa Mbu.

In 4W maths class, they practised measuring in metre and centimetres using measuring tapes. Students had to do a

standing jump while their podmates measured their jump. Some students managed to jump over 1 metre! #teamwork #problem solving #communication

As Measurement week progressed, students moved on to Capacity. They used four liquids - "bubbly bog, snail slime, yellow poison and rose water" to make up different potions.

The children worked in pods accurately measuring each

liquid to make a potion. At the end they added up the amounts to find if they had the right amount in their potion. Some found it challenging to read the different sized measuring jugs and

then pouring the correct liquid in.

Their topic was "Life in Vietnam". Our student hosts shared a glimpse of daily life in Vietnam, exploring language, the natural environment, local Vietnamese food, local culture and led us in playing a fun game on Kahoot!



Our students then shared some things about Tanzania and our school. The Zoom Postcard incuded more than 90 participants from 17 schools in Australia, Germany, India, Canada, UAE, Armenia, Tanzania, South Africa, USA, Tanzania and the UK. After the quiz, participants

were invited to share a bit about their own part of the world, and we learned some interesting facts about India, Armenia, the UK and Australia.

Some reflections from our students:

Kaylah - I learned that Vietnam is an exciting place to visit and what I loved about it is that it has the biggest cave in the world

Owen - I learned how to say Hello - xin chào Goodbye - tạm biệt and Thank you - cảm ơn

Miss Ojoo's Year 6W pizza box project was based on different books. Pictured is each pod showing their book cover.






